

(continued) - 4/7/22 - through a 3/4" nozzle at a pressure of 40 lb. when the full length of hose(500 ft.) is in use. The pump has a capacity of 140 gal. per minute. When the tank needs filling, this same pump will fill them from the streams along the right-of-way.

6/13/22 - (Whittlesey) More pulpwood & logs have moved through here the past 2 weeks than the past 8 months. This we hope is a sign of better times.

11/9/22 - Lambert P. Lamberty started his logging crews east of Ernest Zuther's place yesterday. He will employ about 10 men all winter and will cut logs, ties, and pulpwood. Last summer he intended to build a house, handy to his logging operations, but could not get at it, so he will have to get along with a shack this winter. Mr. Lamberty has a big block of timber in that section and is 1 of the most successful and enterprising loggers in N. Wisconsin.
