## Rib Lake Plant Saves Waste

Toward the end of December a switch was closed at Rib Lake which synchronized with the system of the lake Superior District Power Co., a 1000 kilowatt turbo-generator unit. This increased the generating capacity of the company's system by that amount.

The steam for driving the turbine of this unit is supplied by the Rib Lake Lamber Co., in whose power tonse the generating unit and its auxiliaries are installed. Steam is generated in four 200 H. P. return unbular boilers, with special designed furnacys for consuming the wood refuse from the lamber company.

This wood refuse was, for many rears, handed to dumps, not only a waste in itself but requiring the labor of a large crise of men and teams of horses for its disposal into a monument of economical waste. With the coming into operation of the slove unit this waste has been mixed into the savings of thousands of tons of coal for future generations, and has put to work for the present generation another electrical slave of some 1900 H. P., to be utilized at will by the push of a button or the throwing of a switch.

It is expected that the minimum annual output will amount to 5,000,000 kilowatt hours. It strengthens the lake Superior District Power Company's system on its southern end.

This plant stands as a tribute to the men that conceived and carried to completion the plans of elminination of a big industrir<sup>1</sup> waste.

## WORKMEN'S CASES AT COURTHOUSE

Examiners for the Industrial Commission of Wisconsin heard four cases on thier recent visit to Medford. They held the sessions in the circuit court room at the courthouse.

These are cases which come up between employe and employer under the Wisconsin Workmen's Compensation Act. They were handled as follows:

Edgar J. Rice vs. Rib Lake Lumber Co.—Mr. Rice had been injured by being squeezed between two logs in December, 1925. Case was settled with the help of the examiner.

Ragner Broman vs. Rib Lake Lumber Co.— Mr. Broman suffered a hernia in October, 1925. Case held over for more testimony from doctor who attended Mr. Broman at the hospital at Ashland, where he was treated.

Al W. Dow vs. Rib Lake Lumber Co.—Mr. Dow was struck by a timber at the company's saw mill in February, 1926. This case was not completed, as there are several more witnesses to be heard.

O. C. Galler vs. Ripon Produce Co.

—Mr. Galler had some ribs broken
last July 4th, during an argument
with A. K. Johnson, who was manager
of the Ripon plant at Stetsonville at
that time. The testimony in this
case was heard and the case will later be decided by the Industrial Commission.
