

1/10 - John Frozen, Whittlesey, broke 1 of his legs in a Rib Lake Lumber Co. camp, northeast of Rib Lake.

1/24 -

Turbine Generator Damaged
 The 1,000 kilowatt turbine generator at the Lake Superior District Power Co. plant at Rib Lake was again put out of commission last Monday because of a burned out armature, caused by defective insulation. The armature was burned out last summer by lightning. The company's chief engineer and a corps of assistants are at Rib Lake taking out the burned coils and repairing the armature. Until the repairs are completed the Rib Lake Lumber company's two generators are running night and day to supply enough current for use there.

2/28 - (Goodrich) Ed Capelle came home from Natzke's camp on Sunday.

O. A. Peterson has eighty men logging for him in the northeast part of the county. He has twelve teams hauling logs, ties, and pulpwood to Rib Lake. He has loaded thirty cars of forest products the past three weeks. He will need about three weeks more to complete his logging operations for the season.

Fred Freiloth of Rib Lake injured his hip recently while working at the Krause Bros. camp. He was hauling a load of logs to the landing when the logs spread out. Mr. Freiloth was thrown to the ground and while he was down a log rolled against his hip. No bones were broken.

3/7 - Ferd. Frank, millright at the Rib Lake Lumber Co. mill, had part of his right foot cut off when it got entangled in 1 of the saws of the slashers on Sat. He was taken to the Marshfield hospital immediately and it is hoped that the rest of his foot can be saved. The saw cut through his boot and sock and badly mangled his foot.

3/28 - (Interwald) Peterson camp broke some days ago with a grand clean-up. Jobbers also report the cut in. Krause's, Pollacks, Hetlands, Stibbe's, and other camps are cutting firewood. Roy Poppe will now work for the Rib Lake Lumber Co.

- The planing mill of the Rib Lake Lumber Co. was put on double shift last Monday and is now running nights.

4/18 -

Big Logging Season for Lamberty Camps Just Closed

More than four and three-quarters million feet of lumber was cut by the L. P. Lamberty camps during the winter logging season just closed. At one time more than 100 men were employed in these camps which are located near Rib Lake. About 45 men were employed up until the time the camps closed on April 6. The camps opened Oct. 1. Seventeen teams, 12 of which are owned by Mr. Lamberty, were used on the logging jobs during the winter.

Mr. Lamberty is now making arrangements with an Appleton paper mill for pulpwood, which will be put in during the summer. He plans to have a large crew cutting the pulpwood timber which will be purchased from the Rib Lake Lumber company.

Biggest Cut in History Made at Rib Lake Mill

The biggest cut of lumber made in the history of the saw mill of the Rib Lake Lumber company, was made on Thursday, April 11, when the mill cut 100,965 feet of hardwood in ten hours.

The capacity or average cut for the mill for a ten hour day is 135,000 feet of softwood lumber. A record cut of softwood was made on September 22, 1928 when 171,008 feet of hemlock was cut at the mill. The recent day's cut is the mill's record in hardwood, however.

To make this record in hardwood which is much more difficult to saw than the softwoods, requires perfect co-operation of every man from the superintendent down to the sawyers, setters, riders, filers, scalers, and the tail-sawyer, and means that the mill equipment must be in perfect condition. There is probably not another mill or crew in Wisconsin that can match this record cut.
